






READ ACROSS AMERICA

WHAT IS OUR IMPACT?

National research has shown that positive relationships between Littles and their Bigs have a direct and measurable impact on children's lives. By participating in our programs, Little Brothers/Sisters are:

- · More confident in their schoolwork performance
- Able to get along better with their families
- 46% less likely to begin using illegal drugs
- 27% less likely to begin using alcohol
- 52% less likely to skip school

81% reported that it changed their perspective on what they thought possible in life

Sergeant Meadows from the Impact Division generously took on the role of becoming a "Big" mentor. Sergeant Meadows decided to invest his time in efforts to build a positive relationship with his "little".

These relationships can

help children develop into confident adults and build stronger bonds between law enforcement and the families they serve.





Bigs with Badges (BWB) is a one-to-one mentoring program that connects youth with law enforcement and first responders to build lasting relationships. The program gives underprivileged children the opportunity and tools to realize their potential, build their future, and evolve into confident, responsible adults.

S.H.O.C.K. is an 8 week program with approximately 20 juveniles scheduled to begin in early April of 2020.
